

When President-elect Biden takes office, we need change on day one. Because the stakes are so high, _______ in asking our nation's leaders to do the following:

Repair the broken asylum system. Invest in a new system that keeps asylum seekers safe until their case is heard. Asylum seekers have a right to have their cases heard without having to put their lives at further risk. Under the Trump Administration, many have found themselves in detention centers with track records of neglect for sanitation, medical care and personal safety or turned away at the border and sent into dangerous conditions in Mexico.

Recognize that seeking asylum is legal. Halt deportations without due process. The Trump Administration is using COVID-19 as an excuse to deport asylum seekers, often sending people straight from overcrowded detention centers and worsening the pandemic in the process.

The world has felt the absence of U.S. leadership during this pandemic. The Biden Administration must lead by example through fast and flexible financing to front-line humanitarian responders, global coordination to ensure supplies and help get to the people who need it most, and global leadership to secure ceasefire agreements to reach people in need.
